Paul gets his mower wish

A lawnmower. That's what Hokio **Beach teenager Paul Marsters-Sasa** wished for.

He could have had a holiday in Queenstown, met an All Black, or swam with dolphins, but after serious thought, he let the people at Make-A-Wish Foundation know his decision.

Of the hundreds of wishes they receive each year, it was the first time anyone has wished for a lawnmower. But it's more than

It's been a tough year. After a rugby trial last year his legs started swelling, then that night his entire body. He was rushed to Palmerston North Hospital in agony. After a long series of tests, he was diagnosed with kidney disorder

"I was playing rugby and wasn't feeling

He was generally fit. His life was turned swell. Paul was in and out of hospital and had almost six months away from school.

His immune system had packed up so he picked up any bug that was going around. It was a case of trialling a long list of medication illness. He takes a "box" of medication to keep symptoms at bay.

"I'm OK for now. It's definitely changed what I can do and I was a bit gutted, but I am grateful. Other people have other things way

The strapping number eight had to hang up his boots. With no more rugby, basketball or boxing, to keep busy he and cousin Marcel Marsters-Taniwha started mowing lawns, starting with their grandparents' Lillian and Paul Marsters' lawn and vegetable garden.

'It felt good to give Grandad a bit of a hand and learn about growing veges," he says.

A few locals heard about the quality of their work, and it's turned into a weekend side-hustle, although fatigue is still an issue for the 17-year-old. He has "good days and bad days" - hence the wish. Having a ride-on lawnmower meant he and Marcel can keep

His mother, Paula, was initially surprised he wished for a mower, but it soon made

"He said 'no Mum, you have to look at the big picture'. He did think long and hard about it, and this is something he can manage.

"Marcel kept the round going when Paul was at his worst. There's just three months separating them. They're the best of mates. They're good boys.

Paula says they had a visit from local Make A-Wish volunteers Tony Thomas and Letitia Armstrong this year.

'don't be afraid to think big'," she says.

Tony says on visiting Paul he remembers being surprised at his wish, usually taking puppy. But after spending time with Paul it soon made sense. He could see Paul and Marcel's push mower was "on its

"I don't think he could very grateful. He was over were just lovely people

Make-a-Wish is a not for profit and relies on donations and grants. It has granted 240 wishes this year – in Paul's case a donation from the Ted Manson Foundation. Tony and Letitia are among 200 volunteers nationwide.

Wish producer Helen Somerville says wishes are referred by either medical specialists or social workers and wish producers confirm their eligibility. Volunteers then follow up with family and than \$9000, and gave Paul a few pointers. Not too long after, Paul and Marcel headed out

Waikawa access back

Vehicle access at Waikawa Beach via the entrance at 47–49 Manga Pirau Street will be permitted again after a vote at the first full meeting of Horowhenua District Council on Wednesday.

Mayor Bernie Wanden said the decision reflected a careful and considered journey, acknowledging the strong and often opposing views within the community, and the desire for clarity and certainty about how access can work in practice.

"This is a sensible compromise that recognises both the special character of Waikawa Beach and the good work the local community group has done to bring together sharply different perspectives," he said. "I'd like to make special mention of local iwi, Ngāti Wehi Wehi, whose guidance and expertise have been essential in ensuring cultural values and environmental considerations remain at the centre of the process."

He said he knew not everyone would agree with the decision.

"But this approach gives the community, DoC, Horizons and council the opportunity to test how managed access can operate while protecting the environment and respecting this unique place."

The council's decision follows an extensive period of engagement, including workshops, site visits, and discussions with iwi, agencies and representatives of various Waikawa community groups.

In a media release after the meeting, the council said that through the process, councillors sought to establish a clear, structured pathway that responded to community concerns while providing practical certainty about the immediate next steps.

It said that during the debate, councillors Jennings and Gray played a key role in proposing a series of additional resolutions

that were adopted to strengthen safeguards and ensure clarity for residents.

"These additions provide direction on signage, environmental monitoring, neighbour privacy measures, and the expectations for respectful behaviour by users of the track," the release said.

Cr Mike Barker said the updated resolutions options to provide a more enduring reflected what the community had been asking for.

"People told us they wanted clarity and confidence about the process," he said. "What we agreed today ensures monitoring, stronger education, and clear expectations for how the track should be used."

Key aspects of the decision were:

- a trial period allowing vehicle access to the beach via council-owned land entered from 47–49 Manga Pirau Street
- council to apply for an easement with the Department of Conservation to formalise access across DoC land
- installation of clear signs outlining suitable vehicle types, cultural and environmental expectations, and conditions of access
- monitoring of driver behaviour, dune and vegetation impacts, and other environmental indicators
- council to work directly with neighbouring residents to design appropriate privacy and amenity measures such as planting, fencing, screening and parking controls
- a collaborative education campaign to be developed with the community group
- confirmation that this access point is an interim measure only, due to practical and environmental constraints
- council to continue investigating long-term access options, including potential land acquisition or alternative alignments.
 The Manga Pirau Street access is not

expected to be a suitable long-term solution, as vehicles towing boats can't use it and neighbouring properties are affected. The council will continue to explore long-term options to provide a more enduring and community-supported access point.

Elected member pay confirmed

Pay for the mayor and councillors were formally adopted alongside the different roles and appointments of council sub-committees at a Horowhenua District Council meeting on Wednesday.


Elected members don't set base salary values and have accepted the recommendation of the Remuneration Authority's allocation of a total pool of \$557,603, which council then decides how it's split.

Bernie Wanden's base mayoral salary is \$157,896, with deputy mayor David Allan's base salary set at \$66,288.

Elected members all receive a base salary of \$38,993, with extra for those chairing council sub-committees. Risk and Assurance chair Sam Jennings will receive \$56,540 base salary, community and wellbeing chair Jo Mason \$52,641, Hearings and Regulatory chair Clint Grimstone \$52,641, Community Funding Committee chair Nina Hori Te Pa \$48,742.

Foxton Community Board chair Ross Brannigan will receive \$14,999; other board members \$7499.

Funding helps with Waikawa planting

Waikawa Beach Environment Group has been able to begin new planting project with the help of a Freshwater grant from Horizons Regional Council

A community site preparation and planting day held last Saturday morning (see photo) saw 700 plants dug in. The project is

on a section of land along the Waikawa Stream, also helped with the support of Ngāti Wehi Wehi, and landowners Te Roera Puna and Caroline Beaufort, who opened part of their property for the planting.

Group spokesperson Debra Betts says the Horizons grant allowed WBEG to buy native plants specifically suited to riparian restoration.

"It's an investment that will help strengthen streambanks, improve shade, and enhance habitat over time," she

says. "Riparian planting is one of the most effective and practical ways communities can care for waterways, and we're grateful to be working alongside our local iwi and landowners to support this shared goal."

The volunteer group was also given funding through Horizons' Kanorau Koiora Taketake – Indigenous Biodiversity Community Grant earlier this year to support its work in restoring and maintaining indigenous plants at Waikawa Beach.

"Waikawa Stream is an important taonga for our community," Debra says. "This [latest] project is a chance for locals, landowners, and Horizons to come together to enhance an area that has wide-ranging benefits – for people, plants, birdlife, and the wider environment."

Xmas meal at Salvation Hall

People living in Salvation Army Social Housing (SASH) were treated to a special Christmas dinner at the Salvation Army Hall in Durham Street on Wednesday night.

Levin resident Roger Watkins approached local businesses for food and shoulder-tapped some associates living at Speldhurst Country Estate to help in the kitchen – even Father Christmas made a visit.

They helped prepare meals as people and families were seated to a menu of ham and turkey with mixed vegetables and gravy in a hall decorated with Christmas lights.

Roger was a driving force behind a similar Christmas event for years while living in Porirua. He's been living in Levin for a year now and wanted to hold an event here for people that might not otherwise have a Christmas dinner.

More than 100 invitations were sent out, and 65 meals were prepared followed by carol singing to a brass band.

"The big thing is the community gets behind it with food donations and sponsorship," he says.

The event in Porirua is still going, targeted at people aged more than 70, and Roger is still involved there too with more than 200 people attending.

"It's something you get a buzz from. I do. It brings people together," he says.







Council backs boy racer bill

Horowhenua District Council is "strongly" urging Parliament to fast-track new laws aimed at cracking down on antisocial behaviour with vehicles.

The region has been victim to some of the worst offending of so-called "boy racers" – two big incidents in Levin in as many years left police officers injured, bystanders hospitalised, and residents terrified.

In a formal written submission, the council is supporting proposed changes in the Antisocial Road Use Legislation Amendment Bill, seen as essential to protecting both police and the public. The council says the proposed changes would give police the tools they urgently need to prevent similar events from spiralling into violence.

In June 2024, Levin was brought to a standstill when more than 200 vehicles flooded the town without warning. State Highway 1 was blocked and fireworks and rocks were hurled, injuring police.

A similar gathering in May this year (photo above) involved the Armed Offenders Squad and Eagle helicopter. Fireworks were again thrown at police, and a car was used aggressively against police as they tried to disperse the crowd.

In the submission, Mayor Bernie Wanden says these events show why strengthened police powers are necessary.

"These situations are unacceptable for our community," he says. "We strongly support the measures in this bill."

The problem wasn't just in Levin – he noted similar incidents in New Plymouth, Manawatū, Wellington and the Hutt Valley – but "being central to these areas, Levin has been a congregation point".

Bernie says no community should be exposed to that level of anti-social behaviour and he

wants police to be able to stop similar gatherings before they spiral.

"If police had the power then to close the roads before those people arrived, there would very likely not have been the violence, injuries and damage that occurred," the submission says.

The council is fully endorsing the bill, arguing that it would provide police with "a more comprehensive response" to prevent disruption and violence.

It wants police to have the authority to temporarily close an area of road, introduce tougher penalties and infringements, and outlaw "frightening and intimidating convoy".

Meanwhile, the council also welcomes the bill's application to beaches, which are legally public roads, and where there has been an increase in dangerous behaviour.

Two die in Foxton Beach fire

Police say two people died in a house fire this week at Foxton Beach, but they were not identified by press time. Emergency services were called to the Queen Street house about 5am on Tuesday. Police later recovered the bodies of two victims.

New CE at Ucol

Ucol has appointed Jasmine Groves as new chief executive, from January 1 next year. Jasmine has held roles at Massey University, Public Education Foundation, Heart Foundation Australia and Swinburne University in Melbourne, and has been part of Ucol's executive leadership team for almost five years. Ucol council chair Leanne Southey says the appointment reflects strong confidence in Jasmine's capability and vision.

Another year on roundabout

Construction of a new roundabout connecting Waitārere Beach to State Highway 1 is expected to continue until late 2026. Work will run from 6am to 6pm each day for most of next year. A lane shift and a 30km/h speed limit is currently in place, although traffic management will change as works progress.

People with disabilities celebrated

More than 120 people gathered in Levin last week for a lively and inclusive celebration of the International Day of Persons with Disabilities (IDPwD).

Now in its fourth year, the United Nations-recognised day promotes the rights, dignity and wellbeing of people with disabilities.

Celebrations locally have grown into a major community fixture, highlighting the voices, talents and lived experiences of disabled residents and their support networks. The three-hour event is held at the Levin Uniting Church and Community Centre, and features activities that include arts and crafts, adaptive recreation, karaoke, dance, a sensory room, hauora stalls and plenty of food.

A standout moment came from Manawa Koa Kapa Haka, who stepped in at short notice after their original engagement was cancelled. Travelling from Palmerston North, the group delivered a powerful performance that brought the

audience to its feet and infused the event with energy and pride.

Key to shaping this year's gathering was the involvement of Lael Marshall and the Limitless crew, a group that emerged from earlier IDPwD events and now contributes lived-experience leadership to the organising team.

Lael, who is neurodiverse and lives with invisible disabilities including autism, ADHD and Ehlers-Danlos Syndrome, says the day offers a chance to celebrate identity and capability.

"Disability Day is about celebrating our disabilities and the strength, pride and community that comes with them... Let's celebrate who we are and everything we can do," she says.

The event was delivered through a partnership between Levin Uniting, CCS Disability Action, Mash Trust, and Muaūpoko Tribal Authority, with support from Sport Manawatū, Parafed,

Levin Basketball Association, Ucol, Rapid Relief Team and Manawa Koa.

Schools throughout the district also contributed by hosting Purple Dress days to raise awareness and funds for future IDPwD celebrations. Horowhenua District Council, Foxton New World and Gilmours Palmerston North helped with sponsorship, ensuring the event remained free and accessible.

Levin Uniting community development manager Michelle Rogerson says the day reflects a deeper purpose: "Events like this change the way communities see disability...you're building a future where everyone belongs."

Organisers say planning for the 2026 celebration is already under way, driven by a shared commitment to building a more inclusive Horowhenua.

Select Committee this year, particularly as we partnered with the Finance and Expenditure Committee on the Inquiry into Banking Competition. The final report placed strong focus on rural issues, recommending practical steps to strengthen competition and better support our rural communities. It was also fantastic to see Parliament pass

legislation in September to curb largescale farm-to-forestry conversions on high-quality farmland – a clear sign our government is backing farmers and growers, protecting food security, and safeguarding the land that drives our economy.

Here in Rangitīkei, it's been another busy and rewarding year. I've welcomed 13 of my minister and MP colleagues to the electorate, along with the prime minister in July. I've attended 182 events, worked through 96 sitting days in Parliament and met with hundreds of constituents.

A major development this year has been the boundary changes, which will see the mighty Horowhenua – including Foxton, Wāitārere, Levin, Öhau and Manakau – become part of the Rangitīkei electorate at the 2026 General Election.

As we head into Christmas and the summer break, I hope you have the chance to relax, recharge, and enjoy time with family and friends. Please take care on the roads and in the water, and a special thank you to those who will be working through the holidays – our amazing emergency services, first responders, defence personnel, and those keeping essential services running. Thank you for your dedication and hard work.

Signs look positive for the blue corner

Little short of politically explosive events during the next 11 months seems likely to upset projections that Horowhenua and Kāpiti will be strongly in the blue corner when Election 2026 is held.

National already has its candidates selected for the two electorates –Tim Costley in Kāpiti and Suze Redmayne in Rangitīkei (now incorporating almost all of Horowhenua). Both are sitting MPs and well connected to both constituencies from their terms in Ōtaki and Rangitīkei respectively.

They can at this stage look forward to positive economic developments that encompass the country as a whole, while their respective regions will likely benefit directly from the coalition government's bid to forge a fresh trading relationship with India that will open wider doors for sales of horticultural products.

Labour has named Sophie
Handford, a star of youth politics
and a member of Kāpiti Coast District Council
from 2019 to earlier this year when she left
office to prepare for a run at entry into the
nation's Parliament. Both as a councillor
and an old girl of Kāpiti College, where she
was head girl in 2018, Handford has a string
of testimonials endorsing her talents as an
emerging political achiever.

Among these testimonials is her role as founder and national co-ordinator of School Strike 4 Climate in New Zealand which, among its various activities, organised on September 27, 2019, a mobilisation of climate protest that involved some 170,000 people across more than 40 events around the country.

Her candidacy for Kāpiti suggests Costley

will not be able to rely on his current goodwill in the old Ōtaki electorate to carry him through. Boundary changes have placed him more at the mercy of voters in the southerly areas of the electorate where Handford can be expected to have deep-seated loyal support. She represented

the Paekākāriki-Raumati ward on the district council.

In the Ōtaki electorate at the last election Costley personally polled well ahead of the National party vote – 22,145 to 16,520. Labour did not benefit. Its candidate vote (Teresa Ngobi) was 15,374 and the Labour party vote 13,709. The beneficiary was Act with a lift from 1327 for the candidate to 3306 for the party.

Handford could expect to win back for Labour that party vote switch from National to Act and to earn a higher personal vote than Labour's candidate achieved in Ōtaki. But the support Costley has in the northern reaches of the electorate suggest victory for

Labour has yet to select its candidate for Rangitīkei. Against the background of agriculture and horticulture providing backbone strength to the nation's finances while benefitting from a sympathetic ear in the Beehive, it is not a constituency expected to turn against Redmayne.

Labour would represent an upset.

Last election in 2023 she gained 18,945 votes in Rangitīkei to 9160 of Labour's candidate. The National vote was 17,018 and the beneficiaries

of the drop in the party vote for National were the candidates of Act and NZ First, not Labour.

National's record in office as part of the coalition will have done little to shake the hold it has in the electorate. The predicted economic turnaround is starting to emerge. Farmer income returns are strong. Red tape is being cut. Interest rates and inflation are about where they should be for quality economic growth to occur. Classroom education performance surveys are showing positive signs and global trade uncertainties have been managed well to preserve market access.

It is these positive aspects for National that give rise to the belief that opinion polls placing Labour in a reasonable position to form the next government in association with the Greens and Te Pati Maori (TPM), offer only false hope to the three opposition parties.

This belief would change if the leading party on the left assembled a comprehensive programme of action. The programme would need to be sufficiently convincing that it could withstand verbal and written assaults on both the party's record when last in office and the performance of its front bench members in the

previous Labour-NZ First-Greens Cabinet. In particular, leader Chris Hipkins will find his record as a minister, especially in education, will be in the spotlight.

The positioning of NZ First will be crucial, as it has been in the past three elections. National needs a two-pronged approach to morally, at least, cut down the scope for bargaining that NZ First has. The first of these is the most difficult requirement – achievement of more than 36 percent of the vote. The second is an election manifesto that sets out the forward goals of National with the steps it plans to achieve them.

On the face of the latest polling the vote percentage needed is a big "ask." But evidence is accruing that the recent 30-32 percent support levels are a low water mark for National.

The health and welfare systems remain weaknesses for the coalition. But Labour's annual conference produced little to suggest it had moved greatly beyond a "tax and spend" philosophy. The Ardern political albatross of all talk and no action needs putting down with an emphasis on the practicality and prudence of the party's policies across the board.



Mrap up a garden gift for Xwas

Tith Christmas only about four weeks away, many of you will be sorting out what presents to buy for whom.

Gardening related gifts are always appreciated by the beginning gardener through to the seasoned.

Garden centres these days offer such a diverse range of gardening and gardening related products that you are sure to find a number of products that are very suitable, at prices within your budget.

Water features are very popular at this time and you will see small units that are ideal for indoor use as well as outside.

An indoor setting of house plants with a small water feature will not only look great but the moving water will create a humid area that is ideal for plants.

Foggers also are a current favourite to enhance a water feature.

Container plants for outdoors can be purchased, or you can add a personal touch by selecting a suitable container for a feature plant and potting it up yourself, finishing it off with a few flowering seedlings such as lobelia around the edges of the container.

Gardening gift vouchers are excellent gifts and the lower nominations of \$5 and \$10 are nice to add to a Christmas card.

You can purchase the current national garden gift cards in New Zealand, which are now branded as "Give a Garden gift cards". These cards are offered by the same industry association (now known as NZPPI/Nursery and Garden Industry New Zealand) and are widely available and redeemable at more than 150 garden retailers nationwide, including big



stores like Mitre 10, Palmers, and Kings Plant Barn.






