

The iconic Waitarere Beach shipwreck Hydrabad has all but disappeared beneath the sand, 147 years since that fateful storm.

When she ran aground, Mary Holmwood, wife of captain Charles Holmwood, was heard to cry "goodbye old ship" as she was carried safely to shore. Now, it's time to say goodbye to Hydrabad again as shifting sands slowly swallow her stubborn bones.

She won't be forgotten. Her memory is well and truly alive thanks to the amazing work of some local historians over the years in documenting her history and collecting memorabilia - notably by local men Rex Bowater and Ron Hubbard.

It is a real credit to them both in keeping alive the memory of *Hydrabad* and telling her story. What was a labour of love saw short films made, Ron even painting magnificent artworks of the ship.

It makes sense that beach giftshop owner Sheila Milne should stock and sell Hydrabad images and curio. She says she can't go a day

without striking up a conversation with a tourist about Hydrabad.

She hears stories of how the wreck was two storeys high, of how people can remember diving from it, of driving their car inside, of twilight barbecues, and bonfires at night.

"It's obvious how the Hydrabad played a big part in the lives of people here and how they have fond memories," she says.

The fact that she once lay near the water's edge gives the illusion that time and tide have pushed her farther from the shore. But that's not

Horowhenua District Council chief executive Monique Davidson says Waitārere Beach is a central point of a large and active dune system. Sand carried from the Volcanic Plateau by Whanganui, Rangitikei, and Manawatū rivers is driven in a south and east direction by prevailing currents and winds, and accumulates along the Horowhenua and Kāpiti coasts to form dynamic dunes, accruing land at a rate of almost 1.5 metres every year

So Hydrabad hasn't moved at all – the beach is moving around her.

The fact her wreck has survived so long in the

harshest environs is a tribute to the men who made her, from Scottish Lawmorr cast iron that was folded, layer on layer like filo pastry under great heat. Her iron plates were said to be "of greater thickness than those of any merchant ship afloat", and she had been dubbed "the strongest ship in the world".

As strong as her bones were, just as much attention was given to her inner beauty – parts of the staircase were made of gold, there were carved teak panels, ornate cabins lamps and engraved silverware.

She first launched in 1865, a 70m-long cargo and passenger ship displacing 1350 tonnes with three distinctive masts, the tallest 11.3m. At her bow was a huge carved Hindu warrior, bearded and wearing a turban, gripping his sword.

Her hull was black, with a broad white line across her ports and a smaller thin white line painted just below the water line.

A total of 407 passengers were aboard on her previous voyage from Britain to Australia, her 13th voyage between hemispheres. Thankfully, just 35 were aboard when cyclonic winds delivered her to Waitarere the night of June 24, 1878.

She had started the previous day making slow time in calm winds near the top of the South Island, on her way from Lyttelton to Adelaide.


Captain Holmwood's log tells how the barometer dropped at midnight and the wind stiffened. By morning a cyclone was blowing from the west.

"I fully expected to have got under Kāpiti. Even after the sails were blown away I thought we should get there," he said. "The sea was so full of foam it was impossible to see anything. I never saw land from the time I left The Brothers until...."

At the mercy of the sea and bobbing in darkness toward Waitarere, the captain ordered the crew to "let go the anchors". But the steel chain snapped like thread, so he veered her toward land to minimise damage to her hull. When she hit the sand he was thrust heavily into the main mast.

The crew made a dash for the lifeboats, but he ordered everybody to stay aboard, assuring them it would be far safer at daybreak. To his credit, no lives were lost.

Numerous attempts to refloat her failed. And so she rests.

Water plan gets tick

From July 2027 Central Districts Water will deliver water services to residents in Horowhenua, Palmerston North and Rangitīkei.

Until then each council will manage its own water services. Once CDW is operational, the councils will retain ownership as shareholders.

The government recently approved the joint Water Services Delivery Plan for the three councils. The plan sets out how drinking water, wastewater, and stormwater services will be delivered.

Horowhenua Mayor of Bernie Wanden says approval of the new entity is "exciting news".

"The partnership will mean water assets remain locally owned, enable councils to meet tougher government regulations, keep costs affordable for our communities, and deliver safe, resilient and sustainable water services."

The plan needed to be approved by the Department of Internal Affairs, which is

overseeing the water reform process.

"Our plan only needed minor clarifications prior to sign-off, which shows how well thought out it was. I'm looking forward to working with the mayors, chief executives and councillors of all three councils," Bernie says.

Recruitment for the governing board of CDW is expected to begin in early 2026.

Armistice remembered

"We honour the sacrifices made in the pursuit of peace and freedom," Mayor Bernie Wanden told those assembled at the Levin Cenotaph to remember Armistice Day.

"We are reminded of the immediate impact of World War 1. Millions lost their lives, families were torn apart and nations changed forever. And its effects reach far beyond the battlefield. We are reminded of the cost of war and the value of peace."

He said he hoped the memory of this Armistice Day, a day of deep significance, would inspire everyone to strive for a world where the devastation of war was a memory, not a reality.

The Armistice was signed at 11am on November

 $11,\,1918.$ It officially ended the First World War.

This year's service in Levin was led by Lindsay Duncan of the RSA Executive. Noel MacDonald was the piper, while Andrew Willis was bugler. Students of Waiopehu College sang the national anthem and its head students, Phoenix Tassell and Flos de Joras, read the poem *In Flanders Fields*.

Derek Kaa read *The Ode* in te reo Māori, while RSA president Bruce Prescott read it in English. Wreaths were laid after the service.

Levin's Repair Café celebrated five years last Saturday, along with the win of another award

The repair café won the Heart of the Community Award at the recent Electra Business and Innovation Awards. In 2021 it won a Keep New Zealand Beautiful award.

Its youngest volunteer, Jack (he didn't want his surname published) was given the honour on Saturday of cutting the birthday cake, together with Mayor Bernie Wanden.

Jack, 17, has been at the café helping fix computers for the past three years and has since wandered into 3D territory. He is studying for a diploma in IT and is hoping to move into the bachelor's programme next year.

He says his two 3D printers can make mechanical parts that turn, as well as flexible things. He made a holder for his can of fizzy drinks as well as a tie, which he wore to the Electra awards dinner.

He is also into cosplay, meaning he is making armour. He says he wanted his computer skills to be useful so he volunteered at the repair café. Among other things he turns several broken laptops into one useful one.

Mayor Bernie told the volunteers he admired their work. "It takes a lot to sustain something like this that started from nothing," he said.

He pointed out that the community paid a lot to get rid of rubbish, so "the more we can divert away from landfill the better. You provide a very valuable service."

At the celebrations, Ōtaki business Go Traffic Management donated a cheque for \$5000. Café cofounder Victoria Gregory said it was appreciated as the koha for repairs had dropped in recent times.

 Levin Repair Cafe operates at the Senior Citizens Hall on Cambridge Street, Levin, every second Saturday (except January) from 10am to 1pm.



Thomsons focus of talk

The lives of a well-known couple and their contribution to Levin will be the focus of this month's Horowhenua Historical Society meeting.

Society member Kevin Miles says the late May and Noel Thomson (above) made a significant impact on the town during the 50 years from the 1930s through to the 1980s.

They married and moved to Levin from Wellington in the 1930s, and had an orchard on Weraroa Road. Noel, a solicitor, acquired the practice of P H Harper in Levin in 1933, which became Harper, Atmore and Thomson. He was a Levin Borough councillor, and president of the Waiopehu Tramping Club, Federated Mountain Clubs and Levin RSA.

May became the first female teller for the Commercial Bank of Australia in Wellington in 1918. She worked there until her marriage to Noel in 1930. The couple had no children, but were involved in sporting, recreational and social aspects not only of the area but nationally.

"May in particular was flamboyant and contributes to a fascinating story," Kevin says.

MUSICAL THEATRE ON QUEEN

A MONTH after construction officially began on the Ōtaki-North Levin expressway, the focus is on building haul roads.

These roads let dump trucks move earth around the site without increasing traffic on main roads. About 60% of the haul roads are already done.

Crews are also working on sediment retention ponds and reservoirs. Sediment ponds help keep waterways clean by catching runoff from the work site. Reservoirs store water that's used during construction - especially for keeping dust down. Some of these reservoirs will later be transformed into permanent wetlands. Other work includes building temporary fencing, making access tracks, and clearing vegetation.

Ute collision knocks out power to 600

More than 600 homes and businesses in Levin were without power around breakfast time yesterday morning (Thursday) after a north-bound ute collided with a power transformer on Main Road South, near Annies Bakery.

Electricity went out just after 7am and was restored to a majority of connections by 8.15am, although more than 60 connections in the immediate area were without power for a further period of time.

There were no reports of injury.

'Age friendly' Mitre 10 recognised

Horowhenua Grey Power is welcoming the willingness of local businesses taking measures to make life easier for elderly and those with mobility challenges.

Parade the showground vandals in front of committee



Defacing fire trucks

I note with dismay the defacing of public property, by the paid "Yellow Watch", of the Levin fire appliances. This is a very immature way to make a protest. If you have a point to get across, fair enough. The New Zealand Professional Firefighters Union could buy an advert in the local papers to outline your grievances. Do not deface property that is not yours. Using the Levin fire appliances as a mobile billboard to make your case is not acceptable. Police, nurses, St John, teachers and other well-respected workers have issues as well. The four-crew Yellow Watch operates Monday-Friday during daytime hours. Starting out in business – sole trader or limited liability company?

When starting a business, one of your first key decisions is whether to operate as a sole trader or register a limited liability company.

Each structure has different legal, tax, and compliance implications under New Zealand law. The right choice depends on your goals, risk level, and long-term plan. **Sole trader**

As a sole trader, you trade as an individual, using your own name or a chosen business name. You don't need to register with the Companies Office; however, you will need to register with Inland Revenue (IRD) for tax purposes. You may decide to get a New Zealand Business Number (NZBN), but it's not mandatory. Your business income is included in your personal income tax return, and you might need to register for GST if your annual turnover exceeds \$60,000.

- Simple and low-cost setup: minimal paperwork and few ongoing obligations.
- Full control you own and control the business, meaning you make all the business decisions and keep all profits.
- straightforward tax reporting business income is taxed at your personal rate.

Cons:

- Unlimited liability you and the business are legally the same, you are personally responsible for business debts and legal claims. This means your personal assets, such as your home or savings, could be at risk.
- Limited growth potential harder to attract investors or outside funding.
- Less formal image might appear less credible to larger clients or suppliers.

Limited liability company

A limited liability company is a separate legal entity, created by registration with the New Zealand Companies Office under the Companies Act 1993. The company is the one that enters into contracts, own assets, and can be sued. You will need at least one



shareholder and one director (who must live in New Zealand or Australia).

- Limited liability separate legal entity that exists independently of its owners (shareholders). This means shareholders are generally not personally liable for company debts, protecting personal assets.
- Professional credibility having "Limited" in your business name can build trust with customers and investors
- Easier to scale you can issue shares, bring in investors, and separate personal and business finances.
 Cons:
- Higher setup and compliance costs registration, annual returns, and accurate record-keeping are required.
- Director responsibilities: directors must comply with the Companies Act, including duties to act in good faith and avoid trading while insolvent. If a director breaches their duties under the Act, they can be personally liable.
- Separate taxation: the company pays 28% corporate tax, and any dividends you take may be taxed again personally.

If you're starting small and want minimal admin and limited financial risk, a sole trader structure is often best. However, if you plan to grow, hire staff, or take on financial risk, a limited liability company offers better protection and credibility. Before deciding, it's wise to consult a both an accountant and a lawyer to ensure your choice fits your business goals and obligations.

Narcotics, substance abuse rising as election issues

The approach of major political parties toward narcotics trafficking and reducing the harm of substance abuse experienced by individuals and communities may well be among key issues arising in next year's election

Calls by criminology experts to establish a specialised state agency to deal with transnational crime and its confirmed links to the growth of narcotics sale and use in New Zealand and the Pacific Islands have brought the

issue to the forefront of political dialogue.

It is an issue politicians of all political stripes can no longer ignore when latest reports disclose cocaine consumption more than tripled in 2024 against a rolling three-year average, while there was a "sharp" increase in methamphetamine (P) use – up 74 percent on that average. Wastewater testing last year

estimated a 96 percent increase in "P" use. (The Star reported in April that Horowhenua was in the midst of a meth crisis with testing showing more than double the amount of P is being consumed locally compared with the national

These figures should be considered against figures of the Drug Harm Index of 2023 that showed the total cost of drug harm in New Zealand had increased from \$1.904 billion to \$1.941 billion. Personal harm experienced from substances was \$844.71 million and community harm \$1.096 billion. Measures for the cost of personal harm included premature death and loss of quality of life; harm to family and friends; crime that funds drug purchases; and economic

harm through funds invested into other crime; and a reduced tax base.

Fresh strategies and methodologies to deal with both trafficking and personal use should not be difficult to put in place. Criminologists

say, however, that a vital need is better co-ordination between the various government agencies that deal with aspects of the illicit drug trade - communications, transport, seizure, and apprehension.

Singapore is often seen as a nation strongly committed to minimising the impact of drug trafficking and use. That this is the case should not be surprising.

As its high commissioner to Australia has said, it is situated on the doorstep of the Golden Triangle of drug producing nations - Myanmar, Thailand, and Laos – an area described by the United Nations as "literally swimming in methamphetamine."

And like New Zealand, it offers a lucrative market for traffickers, increasingly attracted Down Under because of the prices they can get for their products.

Criticism of Singapore's approach highlights its use of the death penalty for traffickers, with the possession of 15 grams of heroin being the starting point for imposition. Defenders of the country's regime say that while the amount may be low the impact is not. Such an amount can

produce 1200 straws of heroin that can feed the addiction of 180 abusers for a week.

They also point out that when Singapore introduced capital punishment for trafficking in 1990, there was a 66 percent fall over the next four years in the average weight of opium smuggled into the city-state. A study in 2021 among drug traffickers showed that fear of the death penalty was thought by more than 85 percent of those questioned to have reduced the quantity of drugs reaching Singapore, while a slightly lower number thought capital punishment was a more effective deterrent than life imprisonment.

Possession of lesser quantities than that justifying imposition of the death penalty can attract a minimum jail sentence of one year and a maximum of 10 years, with provision also for up to 24 strokes of a cane. A fine of up to \$20,000 can be imposed rather than a jail sentence.

The country's policies also contain provision for rehabilitation of substance abusers. Those who have not committed other serious criminal

or drug offences receive rehabilitation without the recording of a criminal conviction against them. The government says the recidivism rate among abusers halved between 1993 and 2022 from 73 percent to 30.8 percent.

It adds that the stringent approach to drug control has proven highly effective.

"It has successfully kept the drug problem under control and prevented major drug syndicates from establishing themselves in Singapore. The number of drug abusers arrested annually has fallen to about half that in the mid-

Debate during the election campaign on varying approaches to dealing with both trafficking and substance abuse may test the public's approach toward the death penalty. Does the harm caused across families and communities by traffickers warrant such an extreme step? Can more frequent drug seizures and imprisonment function as a deterrent to the surge of trafficking among Kiwi gangs and offshore syndicates from South America and Asia even if a specialised state agency is implemented?

It's worth noting in this context that the rise of drug trafficking gangs in South and Latin America coincided with a rise in government corruption - among politicians and state agencies. Money talks.

A transparent election debate on how best Kiwi society can contain the intrusion of the global narcotics trade into community life here and in the Pacific may at least highlight that provision of effective rehabilitation policies does not substitute for effective deterrent measures.

HĪTŌRIA/History

GEORGE LESLIE ADKIN



GEORGE LESLIE ADKIN was a self-taught scholar with the skills and integrity of a professional. Most of his working life he farmed with little profit or pleasure. His real interest was in geology and archaeology, and in the back room of his small farmhouse he worked late making meticulous records of his work. He was born in Wellington on July 26, 1888, the first of seven children of William George Adkin, a draper, and his wife, Annie Denton. His mother's family were keen naturalists and photographers.

In 1889 the Adkins secured 100 acres in the ballot for sections in the Levin village settlement, although it was some years before they settled on the land. During two years as a boarder at Wellington College in 1903-4 Leslie developed an enthusiasm for collecting plants and rocks and learned to process his own photographs. When he returned to work on the farm he began a diary that would be kept to within a month of his death: an account of farm, community and family life, and a record of his travels and scientific observations. Adkin made many expeditions into the Tararua Range, including, in 1909, the first recorded crossing from Levin to Masterton. In 1913 Adkin took over part of his father's farm. As a special constable during the waterfront strike, he formed lasting friendships with fellow "specials" Elsdon Best and Bernard Freyberg.

Geology and tramping were curtailed during his long courtship of Elizabeth Maud Herd, an accomplished violinist, pianist and painter. Adkin's photographs depict her beauty and their life together with delicacy and passion. They married at Hastings on December 14, 1914, and had two children, Nancy and Clyde. When the sport of tramping developed in the early 1920s Adkin became the acknowledged authority on the northern Tararuas. A series of near-tragedies inspired him to join in producing a reliable tramping map and to help found the Levin-Waiopehu Tramping Club.

He mapped and named mountains, led searches, and set up huts and tracks, acquiring the nickname King of the Tararuas. A new obsession developed in 1926 when Adkin was asked to provide photographs for *Te Hekenga*, an account of Māori life in Horowhenua. With the help of local Māori, he described and mapped hundreds of named Māori sites between the Manawatū and Ōtaki rivers. On Elsdon Best's advice Adkin joined the Polynesian Society, in whose journal most of his ethnological articles appeared.



Ollie scoops sport prizes

Horowhenua College sports prefect Ollie Kennett's successful year in the sporting arena is evident in the number of awards he received at the end-of-year school prizegiving.

The year 13 student excelled as an all-round athlete and was awarded eight sporting awards.

Ollie has twice represented New Zealand – in 2023 as part of the Swimming NZ open water team competing at the NSW open water championships, swimming 5km, and then at the World Triathlon and Multi Sport Championships in Pontevedra, Spain, in June.

Those results and the awards are a just reward for his willingness to challenge himself and put in the training effort behind the scenes, juggling studies, part-time work and volunteer lifeguard duties.

He trained hard for the world event, where he competed in the aquathlon (1km swim/5km run), which involved hours of swimming and run training. Forty-four nations competed in the 30C heat in Spain, but Ollie's experience in open water swimming saw him in the lead pack out of the tidal river water at Larez. He finished a commendable 15th in the under-19 event and was the fifth 17-year-old to finish.

"Representing Aotearoa was an honour and an amazing experience, one I'll never forget," he says. "I'd like to thank my family and awesome sponsors that helped to get me there. I have learned so much throughout the whole experience, especially about how to execute the race in future, and how I need to fuel my body in the heat'.

Ollie continues to train and has his eyes set on qualifying for the World Championships in Abu Dhabi in 2026. He will be attending Massey University next year and has been accepted into the Academy of Sport, where he will take advantage of their conditioning and nutrition programmes as well as support to balance his study and sport.

At the college awards night Ollie was awarded: Best all round sport winner, George Simpson Cup; highest sporting achievement, School Council Cup; athletics senior champion, Martin Clifford Cup; 3000m open boys champion, Hardy Cup; 1500m senior boys champion; 800m senior champion; swimming senior boys champion; cross country senior champion.

Hole-in-one for evergreen golfer

Evergreen Waitārere Beach golfer John Saulbrey (at right) has hit the headlines again, this time for shooting a hole-in-one.

It's a rare feat. Many golfers can live their lives without one, yet this hole-in-one was John's third, coming on the par-3 second hole on Saturday.

It's generally accepted that the odds of an amateur player achieving the feat is 12,500:1, while those of a pro golfer are relatively better at 2500:1.

Earlier this year the 77-year-old achieved the distinction of carding a score lower than his age – another of golf's holy grails.

John has been a playing member of the Moutere Links course near Levin since his late 20s and currently plays off a 9 handicap.



Bowler Bruce still at the top of his game

Veteran indoor bowler Bruce Pedley is still at the top of his game, notching up his 30th career title last month.

The 82-year-old, who is patron of the local club, gained his first title in the open fours in 1990 and has accumulated many titles for Horowhenua and other districts

In 2012 he teamed up with the late Bobbie Pescini, Viv Hudson and Brent Thoms to finish runners-up in the NZ Indoor Bowls mixed fours in Hamilton. More recently he was with Liz Gardiner and Brian Stewart to reach the quarter-finals of the national tournament in the Masters event.

This season Bruce skipped the

winning local team in the regional competition to progress to the NZ finals in the Masters fours in Christchurch, finishing third.

This year he joined Michael Brunton and Paul Rybinski to win the Horowhenua triples event, his 30th title. Bruce and his Levin North Club have also been coaching school children and special Olympics teams to get them interested in the game.

He was awarded a life membership for Horowhenua two years ago in recognition of his success as a player and service as president, selector and coach.




