#### The spirit of Horowhenua shone brightly on Tuesday night as the district gathered to honour its exceptional citizens at the annual Civic Awards.

While long-serving community champions were celebrated for their dedication and impact, it was the remarkable achievements of local rangatahi – recognised through the Youth Excellence Awards – that offered an inspiring glimpse into a vibrant and promising future for the district.

Youth scholarships were presented to 15 local rangatahi who showed outstanding ability in arts and culture, sport, community service and academia. The scholarships recognise the effort, talent and leadership of rangatahi throughout the district by providing practical support as they work toward their goals in their chosen endeavours.

The Arts and Culture recipients also shared performances during the awards evening at Te Takeretanga o Kura hau pō, highlighting the strength of local talent and creativity.

Also recognised were four locals heroes – Mary Davis, Jeffrey Paulin, and Wayne and Debra Kaye – who received Civic Honours, Horowhenua's highest awards, from Mayor Bernie Wanden.

Mary was recognised for her decades of voluntary service and enduring commitment to hockey, heritage, and community life, and her lasting impact on generations of residents in Horowhenua.

Jeffrey was honoured for his decades as a volunteer spanning many organisations, sports, and cultural groups, reflecting a deep commitment to supporting others and strengthening the social fabric of the district. At the heart of his service is Te Whare Mahana Community Hub.

Wayne and Debra Kaye have been pillars of the Levin RSA. Their commitment, leadership, and volunteer service has spanned 15 years, and has been instrumental in ensuring the survival and growth of an organisation that has been a cornerstone of Levin for nearly a century.

There were also four Certificates of Recognition recipients – Corey Prouting, Frank Taylor, Jack Gibson, and Robert Ropata Remihana.

Mayor Bernie said the awards were an annual highlight for the council since they began 20 years ago, in 1995.

"Tonight is about celebrating you – your remarkable achievements, your dedication, and the positive impact you've made on the lives of those around you," he said. "Our community is stronger, kinder, and more vibrant because of your contributions.

"The energy, commitment and care everyone brings to our community is what makes



# Brass band celebrates 125 years

Levin and Districts Brass is celebrating its 125th year and plans to see many more years with a new youth academy that could boost band numbers by at least 30.

The band's bass trombone player, Mat West, has offered to take over the current youth tutoring programme – the academy would be an extension of that programme. He ran a successful academy in Taupō for several years.

President Chris Craddock says the academy could have 30 young people being tutored on brass and percussion weekly.

"The main push for learners will be at the start of 2026 when Mat will visit all schools in the Horowhenua," he says.

Anniversary celebrations will include a special concert and a fundraising programme for new instruments. The band currently has 31 brass players, three percussionists, a musical director, and a compere.

It was originally called Levin Municipal Band,

established on April 21, 1900. In 1989 the band was renamed Levin and Districts Brass.

Chris started with Levin Municipal Band as a 7-year-old learner in 1968. His first national contest with the senior band was in Dunedin in 1974. The longest continuous member of the band is drum major/bass player Nigel Hewit, who started 47 years ago in 1978.

The band's youngest members are brother and sister ?? Maas, 15 (trombone), and Leah Maas, 13 (solo cornet). Their father is musical director Hugh Maas. The oldest playing member is former conductor Colin Honey, 84 (cornet).

Recent success nationally means the band can also celebrate moving up from the national C Grade to B Grade.

The band will have its anniversary concert at

The Village Hall, Speldhurst Country Estate, Levin, at 2pm on Sunday, December 7, followed by a dinner for current and past members at Speldhurst's The George restaurant.

As the band works towards a busy December, the concert will be the culmination of several days of activities. It starts on Wednesday, December 3, with eight hours of carolling at the Levin New World Christmas Club Day. On Friday, December 5, the band travels to Marton for a 7.30pm concert at St. Stephen's Anglican Church, and on the Saturday the band will join the Levin Christmas Parade at 2pm, followed by a barbecue and fellowship at the band room.

# Waiting for God star 'found his people' at Levin theatre

### Damian Reid knew he'd found his people.

Fairly new to town, he went along to watch the performance of *Stiff* at Levin Little Theatre earlier this year.

The 50-year-old hadn't been on stage for years, but after seeing the show he wanted in: "They were having so much fun on stage I got the itch to join in and tread the boards, too."

He successfully auditioned for the part of Tom Bollard in a comedy called *Waiting for God*, which opens tonight (Friday). Alongside co-star Jill Aungiers (Diana Trent) and a talented cast, the show is receiving rave reviews from those who have had a sneak peek of rehearsals.

"You know if the audience laughs as much as we have through the process, we'll be fine," he says.

Damian grew up in Masterton and had worked mostly in sales and IT but has always moonlighted with his creative side.

He's also done some TV, radio and is a celebrant, too. He has hosted corporate murder mystery evenings and quiz nights and was well known as the MC for the annual Armageddon Expo, facilitating Q&As with visiting stars.

But his love for community theatre has always burned bright.

"With live theatre there's an exchange of energy with the audience that you don't get from watching YouTube," he says. "With professional theatre you sometime lose a bit of enjoyment because you have to help promotors bring in the dollars, but with amateur theatre it's all fun.

"It's a way to meet people and after months of rehearsals and then shows you have lifelong friendships. Everyone plays a part – backstage, costume changes, meals before the show.

"If you make a mistake, you know someone will save you and help you get out of it and that feeling of working together is amazing. You're always learning from others and seeing things through a different view. It's a real fun experience.

"And you get to be someone else for a while – for two hours you're not thinking about the warrant of fitness or the mortgage."

He'd watched Waiting for God on TV growing

up and was a fan of English comedy, with shows like *The Two Ronnies, Porridge, Last of the Summer Wine, Allo Allo, The Darling Buds of May* . . . the list goes on.

So he is relishing the role of Tom.

"Technically, the character is 20 years older than I am, so it's given me a glimpse into my future," he says.

The spark between Tom, Dianna and the entire cast and crew of *Waiting for God* is electric and it gets top marks.

Directed by Sonya Grimstrup, it runs from November 21 to December 6.

#### Streets closed for Christmas Parade and Carnival

Several Levin streets will be closed for the Horowhenua Christmas Parade and Carnival on Saturday, December 6. The parade will begin at the corner of Victoria Street and Weraroa Road, turning right onto Bath Street before finishing on Salisbury Street outside the Levin Domain. On that day Victoria Street will close from 11am to 2.30pm to allow floats to gather. Residents will be allowed access but will be asked not to park cars on the street. Salisbury Street will be closed between 1pm and 6.30pm for the Christmas Carnival at the Levin Domain. Weraroa Road (between Victoria Street and Bath Street) will be closed from 1.45pm to 2.30pm, as will Bath Street (between Weraroa Road and Salisbury Street), Hannan Street and Carlisle Street.

#### Delays at roundabout

Motorists can expect detours and delays while the final asphalting and line marking for the new Arapaepae Road/Tararua Road roundabout is under way. A section of SH57/ Arapaepae Road will be closed between Meadowvale Drive and Kimberley Road, and the eastern and western section of Tararua Road from 7pm to 6am each day, excluding Friday and Saturday nights. The work started on Tuesday and is expected to be finished by Friday next week (November 28).

# Puppy ad highlights scam awareness

This week is the 25th anniversary of International Fraud Awareness Week and with scams increasing people are urged to be vigilant – a bogus advert even sneaking into several newspapers around the country, including *Horowhenua Star*.

Local reader Liz Tomescu became concerned after her mother, Mary-Lou Cranshaw, began talking about a Yorkshire terrier puppy she was getting after seeing an advert last month for two "adorable" puppies that needed rehoming.

"Raised in a loving home, they are playful, friendly and great with kids, other pets..." the ad said, without any mention of price. Liz says her mother was telling her about a puppy that needed rehoming – it was going to cost \$200.

"She had emailed the address in the advertisement and was sent photographs of the couple that supposedly owned the puppies and a photo of the puppy wearing a tiara, which of course was adorable. In the email they said they lived in Levin, but there was no address."

Mary-Lou says they wanted a \$200 rehoming fee, but she told them she didn't do PayWave.

"Then they came back with two really cute pictures. I am a sucker for puppies. I gave them my address and said I could drop some money around and would like to come and have a look. The line went dead."

Liz looked at the photos and they seemed suspicious. On searching further she realised there were similar scams all over the world.

The scam has led the Community Newspapers Association to issue a warning after several papers published the advertisement.

Convincing scams involving fake apps, professional-looking websites, and persuasive communication have cost unsuspecting New Zealanders an estimated \$2.7 million in just the first quarter of this year. Netsafe received 6601 reports of phishing – people trying to get personal details, non-existent product scams, sextortion (with sexual content), and harassment in the same period.

Elderly, in particular, are targeted by scammers. With 25 percent of Horowhenua's residents aged 65 or older, local library Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō is helping people understand what to watch out for.

"The average loss per person is \$7500," says Horowhenua Libraries services to older adults librarian Henry Gerber, who has teamed up with Leala Faleseuga, who looks after digital inclusion for the libraries. They have combined expertise to set up services to help those unfamiliar with technology to recognise scams.

"We have many queries coming in as the digital space is often still scary and an unknown territory for many," Henry says.

Leala says scams are crimes.

"We encourage people to use trusted sources like Netsafe to double-check calls from unknown companies or people trying to sell something, and we advise to contact police when they feel threatened."

Libraries run several courses in which people are told not to answer calls from unknown numbers, and they don't have to be polite.

"If callers claim to be from the bank, hang up and phone your bank. If they ring at night, be suspicious and wait till morning. Slowing down is a good thing. Scammers will try to hurry you. Take the time to verify what they tell you.


"These days it's getting harder to see through the scam as messages are accompanied by AI videos that look very real, such as a celebrity or even the prime minister recommending a product or investment scheme. Don't fall for it. And never send your money overseas."

Romance and investment scams are rife and scammers can be convincing by using personal information already gathered online.

"Your information, such as address, date and place of birth are your personal property – even names of your kids and grandkids – and are as valuable as your money," Leala says. "Once scammers have enough info, which they get from social media, they can impersonate you, getting a driver's licence or a passport in your name. That will allow them to do so much more, like opening bank accounts, buying things online and leaving you with the debt."

Information can also be sold on to others.

# **MAHI MĀRA/Gardening**



Many people prefer to buy vegetable seedlings from their local garden shop as they have a head start in comparison to germinating their own seeds at home.

Vegetable seedlings come in three forms: punnets where a number of seeds have germinated and their roots intermingled; six-cell packs that have one or more seeds in each cell that has germinated; and small pots where larger in which more expensive single plants are growing.

The last is often reserved for



the likes of tomatoes, cucumbers, pumpkins, capsicums etc.

Experienced gardeners will likely know what I am about to explain but take it as a

refresher course.

Nurseries supplying these plants are careful to ensure the seedlings have adequate moisture while in their care – they know that if the growing medium dries out the plants will go into stress. They recover when watered, but they're not well enough to grow to maturity. They will grow on for a little while, they'll

eventually go to seed.

This is disappointing for the home gardener hoping for a good crop for the table.

It's not so much of a problem for plants that flower and fruit (tomato, capsicum, cucumbers etc) – if they're stressed they will crop earlier and the fruit might not be as good.

When buying seedlings look for the younger vegetable plants in cells and punnets. If need be, grow them on under your care till they are ready to plant out.

When planting out I have a bucket of water that has had a little manure in it and some Magic Botanic Liquid. I plunge the punnet under the water to watch the air bubbles come out. I do that every day or so while I am holding them, waiting to plant out. They get a good soaking and a bit of food from the solution.

When plant out I soak again till they stop bubbling and on a bench I partly turn the punnet on its edge and tap so that the seedings and the wet mix all fall safely onto the bench.

In a punnet where several seedlings have their roots intertwined, then

back to the bucket of water and while holding then underwater I carefully separate them, which means little or no damage to their roots. Now as individual plants I can plant them out or put them into larger containers to grow.

In the planting hole I put a little manure (like sheep pellets), a pinch of Ocean solids, biophos, neem powder, Unlocking Your Soil and Calcium & Health – just a small amount of each, which puts the goodness in the root zone. This way I don't feed weeds by broadcasting the goodies.

After planting, keep the area moist, preferable with non-chlorinated water, and best earlier rather than later in the day. A weekly spray of the foliage with Magic Botanic Liquid (MBL) will make the world of difference to the health of the plants and in the end your health, too.

If birds or cats are a problem then put crop cover over hoops to keep the seedlings safe and to keep insect pests, butterflies and others off the plants. The crop cover creates an eco-climate and the plants, better protected from elements such as wind, grow bigger, faster, naturally.

Another tip when you bring any plants home is to check them carefully for any insect pests or their eggs. If you find any, rub them off before you plant them. Many insect problems are ones introduced on plants obtained from outside your property.

If you buy a punnet of seedlings and there are more than you want to plant out at that time, simply bunch together the ones left over, make a hole and plant them as a clump. This "heeling in" will hold plants nicely and only slowly grow them till you're ready to lift them and plant more out a couple weeks later. Then you have succession planting without having to buy more seedlings.

# Concern at invasive clam's migration south

Freshwater gold clams have been found for the first time in Taranaki, raising fears the invasive pest species might get into waterways farther south.

They first appeared in the Waikato region in 2023. Horizons Regional Council environmental manager Craig Davey says the Whanganui River Clam Response Group is already working to stop the small and destructive clams getting into the Horizons region.

"With the weather warming up we know that people will be gearing up to get out on their boats and jet skis and move around the motu," Craig says. "This is why we are urging people to use the 'Check, Clean, Dry' method to ensure they're not transferring any clams across waterways."

Dispersal by humans is the most likely way gold clams got into Lake Rotomanu at New Plymouth recently, which is why Horizons is stressing the 'Check, Clean, Dry' message.

"Check – for what is visible, Clean – for what is not visible, and Dry – to be sure," he says. "Everything that touches the water, that includes fishing and boating gear and equipment, swimwear, even the dog, needs to be checked, cleaned and dried."

MPI's advice for cleaning includes

blasting gear and craft with tap water onto grass, and for absorbent materials:

- soak in hot tap water (50-55C) for at least five minutes, or
- soak in 5% bleach solution (5-litre mix = 250ml bleach in 4.75 litres water) for an hour, or
- freeze until solid (overnight), or
- soak in salt solution at 100ppt (parts per thousand) (5-litre mix = 500g salt in 5 litres warm water) for four hours.

It's also important that both gear and watercraft are dry to touch both inside and out for 48 hours.

Craig says freshwater gold clams are difficult to control and eradication has

never been achieved overseas. They reproduce quickly (400 juveniles a day), forming massive populations that can turn river and lake edges into 'clam pavements'. They also clog water-based infrastructure such as electric generation plants, irrigation systems and other water takes.

The clams (*corbicula fluminea*), which are native to eastern Asia.

Three Horowhenua Ucol U-Skills students have been awarded for their efforts this year.



Learners work towards NCEA credits or, in some programmes, can earn a tertiary qualification. Many of the U-Skills programmes act as stepping-stones towards further tertiary study.



#### **Sealed Road Resurfacing**

#### Are you eligible for a rates rebate?

**The second Horowhenua District Council rates** instalment of the 2025/26 financial year is due to be paid by 15 December, and Council is encouraging ratepayers to check whether they are eligible for a rebate.

You should have received your invoice in your letterbox or inbox by now.

The Rates Rebates Scheme provides a rebate of up to \$805 for low-income earners who are paying rates for the home they were living in on 1 July 2025. Rebates will be calculated based on income, the number of dependents living with you, and the total amount of rates you'll pay from 1 July 2025 to 30 June 2026, including Horowhenua District Council and Horizons Regional Council.

Eligible households can have income up to \$32,210 and get the maximum rebate. Households getting more than this may still get a rebate, but it will be less than the full amount. SuperGold cardholders and their households can have income up to \$45,000 and get the maximum rebate amount.

To apply, you'll need proof of income (before tax) for the tax year ended 31 March 2025 (this includes any interest at the bank), proof of your spouse/ partner's or joint income if living together, and your SuperGold card, if applicable.

If you want your rebate applied to the second rates instalment, you must apply by 5 December 2025. Applications received after this date will have the rebate applied to instalment 3.

### Proposed Temporary Road Closures – Horowhenua Christmas Parade

Horowhenua District Council proposes that several Levin streets be closed on Saturday 6 December 2025 for the annual Horowhenua Christmas Parade.

The parade will begin at the corner of Victoria Street and Weraroa Road, turning right onto Bath Street before finishing on Salisbury Street outside the Levin Domain.

We propose that the following roads be temporarily closed to all ordinary vehicular traffic to enable the parade to travel the planned route:

**Victoria Street** will be closed from 11am to 2.30pm to allow floats to gather before the parade begins. While resident access along Victoria Street will be allowed, we ask that no cars be parked on the street during this road closure period.

**Salisbury Street** will be closed between 1pm and 6.30pm for the Christmas Carnival at the Levin Domain.

Weraroa Road between Victoria Street and Bath Street will be closed from 1.45pm to 2.30pm.

**Bath Street between Weraroa Road and Salisbury Street** will be closed from 1.45pm to 2.30pm.

**Hannan Street** will be closed from 1.45pm to 2.30pm. **Carlisle Street** will be closed from 1.45pm to 2.30pm.

Detour routes will be clearly signposted.

No resident access will be available during the period of these proposed closures.

These closures are proposed under clause 11(e) of the Tenth Schedule of the Local Government Act 1974. The proposed closures will apply to all vehicular traffic with the exception of emergency service vehicles and vehicles directly involved with the events.


## No more cash at transfer stations

# Can we sustain the planet that sustains us?

All life exists because the environment sustains it. Humanity exists because Earth sustains us. We endure because our activity – at its best – supports the environment we need.

We are now more than 8 billion people, up from just 1.6 billion in 1900. By the start of the next century, we will be more than 10 billion. The question is not whether the planet can sustain us, but whether we can sustain the planet that sustains us.

The environment provides the fundamentals of life: the sun, the sea, the air, the water (salt and fresh) and the land. These are not ours to own. They can only be shared. We may choose to share equally, or we may continue the long habit of dividing, dominating, and excluding. History tells us the latter always fails.

For millennia, people have sought to dominate through cult, culture, colour, or creed. For three centuries, empires sought domination through wealth, politics, and conquest. All failed, because people ultimately resist domination. Humanity endures only through contribution, cooperation, and connection.

With 8 billion people, we must now learn to manage our environment and resources so that supply meets



demand. If we fail, domination will be the only alternative – and domination has never worked. It is against human nature to expect that it will work in the future.

Politics will not save us. Capitalism will not save us. Money will not save us. These are human inventions, contrived systems built on the intent to dominate others.

Recent history makes plain their failures.

So we must ask: will this century repeat the failures of the past, or will we recognise the patterns and choose alternatives?

Humanity is not condemned to failure. We can share our environment. We can use alternative forms of governance. We can cooperate and manage resources collectively, as we have done at moments throughout history.

The only thing required is commitment – to a better way, to one another, and to the world that makes our lives possible.

# Pay attention to legal issues when a family member dies

### When a person in the family dies, attention must be paid to legal issues.

An "estate" is all the deceased's property, including

their personal possessions like clothes and jewellery, money in bank accounts, any house or land they own of co-own (sometimes called "real" property).

A small estate is one that does not include:

- any land (or an interest in land) or
- any financial assets that are worth more than \$15,000 – money in bank accounts, shares, life insurance policies, KiwiSaver funds, government stock, shares in a company.

If the person has died intestate (without a will) things can become a great deal more complicated. The basic order of priority for the distribution of an intestate estate is: spouse, civil union partner, or de facto partner; children; parents; brothers and sisters; grandparents; uncles and aunts.

In general, the deceased's de facto partner inherits only if they have been together for at least three years. But there are some exceptions. Who receives what, and how much, depends on which family members the deceased has left.

If the deceased left a surviving spouse or partner, but no parents or children, the spouse or partner receives the whole estate. If there are both a spouse and children, the spouse or partner gets:

- the deceased's personal belongings such as furniture, and appliances
- an amount set by the Administration (Prescribed Amounts) Regulations 2009, currently \$155,000, and

• one third of the rest.

The children get the remaining two thirds, divided equally among them.

If the deceased left surviving children but no partner or spouse, the surviving children receive equal share of everything.

If the deceased left no surviving spouse, partner, children, siblings, parents, grandparents, aunts or uncles, the deceased's estate goes to the state

(the government).

When a partner or spouse dies, the surviving partner or spouse can choose whether to receive:

- what they would get under relationship property rules, or
- what they would get under the rules of intestacy.
   If the deceased and the surviving spouse have
   separated, the surviving spouse receives from the estate
   what they would have if they had not separated. But not
   if the Family Court issued them a separation order.

If the deceased had a spouse and a de factor partner when they died, the spouse and the partner share between them what one spouse or de facto partner would have received. This also applies if the deceased had more than one de facto partner.

Stepchildren might also receive from the estate, but this depends on things like their age, their relationship with the deceased, and their financial dependence on the deceased.

# Watch for bird nests and prevent vehicle fires

Summer is nearly here. The gardens are coming alive, the days are getting longer, and the birds are busy building their nests.

It's a lovely reminder that warmer weather is on the way.

But did you know those clever little birds can sometimes cause a big problem?

Every year we hear of vehicles catching fire because birds have tucked hay, straw, or dried grass into places like engine bays or around farm machinery. What looks like the perfect nesting spot for a bird can be a serious fire hazard for us.

When hay or grass builds up under the bonnet or around hot parts of a vehicle, it takes only a quick drive for things to heat up. Engines, exhausts, and brakes all get very hot, and dry material can ignite in minutes.

Once that happens, it can damage or even destroy a vehicle – and worse still, put people and property in danger.

The good news is that there are some very simple steps we can all take to prevent this:

- pop the bonnet and check under there regularly, especially if the vehicle hasn't been used for a few days
- clear away any hay, straw, or nesting material before you head off
- don't forget about utes, trailers, or farm equipment – birds like those, too
- if possible, park away from paddocks or areas where birds are busy gathering grass.



It might seem like a small thing, but taking just a minute for a quick look could stop a fire before it starts.

We all know how resourceful birds can be and how they make use of whatever they can find. It's part of what makes this time of year so special.

But it also means we need to be extra aware. Vehicle fires don't just cause damage; they can spread quickly and put your whānau and community at risk.

So, while we enjoy the sights and sounds of the season, let's also keep safety in mind. A simple check under the bonnet could be the difference between a safe trip and a dangerous fire.

Stay safe, enjoy the warmer days, and let's look out for each other this nesting season. Remember: prevention is always easier than fighting a fire.

# National losing the positive message battle

Political opinion polls suggesting that a majority of the electorate see Labour as a better manager of the economy than National has hurt the government more deeply than probably even a dip below 30 percent in National's favourability ratings.

It's why the parties to the coalition need to put their heads together and ensure the message of economic progress is understood across the country.

That its low-key but steady approach to holding

down expenditure and development of initiatives to increase exports and build opportunities for offshore investment is often scantily known and appreciated, came through at a recent economic conference in Auckland. More than 150 attendees, almost 100 percent Kiwis, at the annual conference of Economic Development New Zealand, were asked how many knew that the government had recently signed a deal with Malaysian companies

to spend \$3 billion here on energy and hotel developments. While the projects would benefit attendees and the country as a whole in coming years, the answer from the conference floor was just three people.

It's examples such as this, embracing a lack of knowledge of positive government moves among the executives and workers in the sectors benefitting from its actions, which is frustrating to both industry leaders and the coalition's supporters. But it also represents a failure of support staff to ministers and of government agencies to communicate effectively with business sectors the opportunities created for economic growth.

Responsibility for a better communications performance lies ultimately with individual ministers. While some might argue that "the media isn't helping", it is they who need to ensure that the people in their offices, and

within the communications teams of state agencies, are working with sector groups to spread knowledge of fresh initiatives. Daily media is not the end point of political publicity.

Such a communications issue did not arise during the Ardern or Key years. The political acumen of both prime ministers was highly tuned to the need for effective "rounded" communications strategies and their execution

among communities of interest. Each had issues management strategists among the most talented in their specialist areas of private commercial practice who adjusted tactics to meet political needs.

Ardern lacked an individual with the across-cabinet enforcement strength of Heather Simpson in her role with Helen Clark, but Key had the Machiavellian Murray McCully in his cabinet, as well as Wayne Eagleson, arguably the country's most respected political manager, as his chief of staff.

constrained by its dependence in office for support from NZ First and Act. Both minor parties can hamstring communication strategies of their major partner as much as they can inhibit political initiatives.

But the "blue corner" needs to devise a strategic answer to the communications issue if it is not to surrender the mantle of economic management to its major opponent.

The country has a strong interest. This year it is estimated to spend more than \$9 billion in interest on a debt of \$185 billion, up from about \$4 billion 10 years ago. The \$185 billion is 42.7 percent of gross domestic product (GDP) and this total is projected to lift to \$238.5 billion by 2029 (45 percent of GDP). This year's tax revenue is forecast to be about \$120 billion.

Shamubeel Eaqub, economist for housing/finance company Simplicity, reckons that for the current budget year this worked out as about \$22,613 per person. He estimates the government gets a further \$7833 per person from "other income" such as ACC levies, fines, and emissions trading.

He says the government would earn about \$30,446 for every New Zealander each year, but spend about \$37,480. The net interest payment made by the government – the difference between the interest on assets like bonds that

the government sells to investors and the money it borrows – is about \$550 per person per year.

"It is not the borrowing per se that is the problem, it's when you're borrowing for groceries," he says. "The last few years we've done that repeatedly. It's not that debt is bad. Debt for stupid things is bad. Debt for high quality infrastructure is good."

In his view the government could not increase spending without increasing either borrowing or tax revenue.

Bryce Wilkinson of the New Zealand Taxpayers' Union says: "The first step back should be to stop spending so many billions of dollars so poorly. To do that requires political courage and an ability to lead high-quality public debate. There are always interest groups benefitting from mediocre quality spending who will fight to preserve it. It means remembering that debt borrowed today is tax collected tomorrow from citizens who had no say in its accumulation. Productive people can emigrate."

As Wilkinson has argued, most families understand the harsh reality of high debt. For New Zealand in the 1950s and 1960s it meant interest rate controls, foreign exchange restrictions, government debt/ratio impositions, and inflation. In politics debt levels tend to become, as Wilkinson has argued, the next government's problem.

Election 2026 seems set to be one that calls for a clear verdict from voters. Higher taxes or more prudent government to get debt levels under control. Economic management will be the "big issue" of 2026.

### **FOXTON'S MR PERRAU**

## Prominent baker had finger in many Foxton pies

#### Mark Edwin Perreau was about as prominent in Foxton early last century as anyone could be.

He was born in Foxton in 1879 and had all his schooling there. About the age of 18 he set himself up as a baker and pastrycook, later opening a branch shop in Shannon.

In 1902 he married a widow, Jane Ellen Savell, daughter of another baker, John Walls. They opened the first general store and tearooms at Foxton Beach.

In his youth Mark was interested in cycling and rugby. He coached junior rugby and later became president of the rugby, bowling, tennis, and swimming clubs, the Repertory Society, and took a keen interest in athletics and boating.

He always had an interest in civic affairs and was elected first president of the Manawatū Master Bakers and Pastrycooks Association. He was also the first president of the Foxton Retailers' Association.

Mark called a public meeting to form the Foxton Chamber of Commerce and was its first president. Citizens elected him mayor in 1925, a position he retained for nearly 20 years until his retirement in 1944.

During the 1920s Foxton's only natural resources were the harbour

and flax, which had been a "boom or bust" industry since 1870.

The harbour was not being used to its full extent since the completion of the main trunk railway – which was originally expected to come through Foxton – so local business people got together to persuade the

government to build a factory to make woolpacks from flax fibre.

Mark donated gave the land for the factory to be built on and so NZ Woolpack and Textiles came into being in 1933. Because it was such a labour intensive industry it gave employment to many people. During the Second World War it manufactured all the woolpacks for New Zealand farmers and made gun mats for the Army. Later the factory turned to the manufacture of hardwearing "Foxton matting".

Mark was a member of the Foxton Harbour Board, but the completion of the Whirokino Cut in 1942 so reduced the flow of water to Foxton that the small coasters couldn't reach the port. Because other means of transport were available by this time, the day of numerous coastal ships was over.

While chairman of the Beach Improvement Society Mark was responsible for formation of the Foxton Branch of the Royal Life Saving Society and was a member of the Surf Club and Fire Brigade. He served many years on the Palmerston North Hospital Board and on its Welfare Committee.

His civic services were recognised in 1953 with an MBE.

More than £1000 (a huge amount in those days) was spent on a beautifying programme while Mark was president of the Foxton Beautifying Society. During the 1930s Seaview Gardens was well known for its fish pond, fern houses, and many flower beds.

Mark and Jane had four children: Rita, Gordon (who took over Foxton Fizz from founder A Stevenson), Hector and Pat. Jane died in 1961.

In 1967 Mark married his housekeeper, Jessie Muir, who died in April 1973, Mark died on June 4 the same year aged 93.
