Levin ready to rock!

A lightbulb idea to showcase local music and musicians on stages all over town has become an annual sound extravaganza that celebrates its 10th anniversary tomorrow.

Apart from missing a year due to Covid-19, the Levin Music Festival has been celebrated every year since 2014, bringing a variety of performers and genres together.

Back then, as owners of a Levin music store, organisers Paul and Eboney King had their ears close to the ground. What they heard was a region brimming with an enormous range of talent. But how to express and share what they were seeing – and hearing?

"The idea of bringing music to our streets began from a visit to a few of our local music clubs," Paul says. "While there we experienced something that hit the heart and we were amazed by it all... the locals who brought talent to each venue.

"That's where the idea of bringing music to our streets came from."

The couple, with the help of the late Boy Cornell, funded the inaugural event themselves and leant on volunteers. The result was organic -200 musicians playing at 14 venues throughout the day. Even Paul and Eboney were amazed at the diverse range of music and musicians that turned out.

"I think we wanted to bring all these musicians and music groups and clubs that we knew of together for a day to celebrate, but even we were shocked at the amount of talent and the range of talent that was out there," Eboney says. "It really has to be acknowledged and celebrated."

Since then the event has had support from Horowhenua District Council and the

occasional Creative Communities grant, but it still runs largely on a shoestring and lives off community spirit.

"At every event we've had a lot of help from friends and locals who jump on board and give us speakers," Paul says.

Last year's event involved 400 musicians who took ownership of their own stage venue

and organised gear, which helps the event run smoothly – people like Keith Murch at Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō and the Levin Folk Club at the Levin Mall stage.

And the popular "drum circle", run by Bob near the town clock where the public are encouraged to join in and jam with a range of instruments and create wonderous harmonies.

"That's the direction we wanted to go... an event organised by the community, for the community," Eboney says.

The Kings want the event to keep growing each year with the intention with which it began – to celebrate and share local music and musicians.

The event goes ahead whatever the weather.

Anger builds at expressway plans

The man who led the charge to build the Ōtaki to North Levin expressway is now an angry man.

Antony Young was spokesperson for Build our Road, a campaign to ensure the expressway fulfilled the needs of Horowhenua residents and businesses. He's also chair of the Horowhenua NZ Trust.

Proposed changes revealed by NZTA Waka Kotahi last week include replacing the interchange exit and entrance into Levin into a five-exit roundabout; removing the southern entrance onramp; and cancelling a bridge intended to connect Manakau Heights with the rest of the community.

The changes are troubling and short-sighted, Antony says.

"For a project designed to improve transport efficiency and reduce travel time across the lower North Island, this last-minute change undermines the very purpose of the expressway," he says. "A roundabout in place of a full interchange [at Tararua Road] will significantly slow freight and commuter traffic, especially for companies like Mainfreight, whose logistics depend on smooth access to their depot."

He says it also raises concerns for public safety, especially in light of the government's stated intention to raise speed limits to 120km/h on some roads.

Horowhenua's population is projected to nearly double over the next 25 years. Antony says this growth demands smart infrastructure that can handle increased traffic volumes and provide seamless north-south connectivity.

He says communities and businesses have engaged in good faith through almost a decade of consultation, consents and design refinement.

"Now, four months before construction begins, we're learning that a fundamental aspect of the plan has been altered with no meaningful opportunity for input."

Antony says he understands the need to contain costs, but he's baffled by the logic behind the recent cuts.

"This expressway is to be toll road, decided after the project was approved, consulted on, and signed off. If users are expected to pay, shouldn't they receive the infrastructure they were promised?"

He says now is a once-in-a-generation opportunity to get it right, and is calling on residents to write to Transport Minister Chris Bishop and NZTA chair Simon Bridges with their concerns. Both strongly advocated for the expressway.

The chief executive of Genoese Foods in Levin, Andrew Parkin, says the proposed changes are a "let down". He says the hold ups between Levin and Wellington got so bad that his firm decided to pull out of Fiji, where they were growing a lot of their basil.

"It just got too hard, so now we grow all our

basil in New Zealand.

The chief executive of Infrastructure NZ and former Porirua mayor Nick Leggett says it's concerning if the changes are to cut costs.

"Saving dollars when infrastructure is built by shaving off important components tends to cost money in the long term. Do it once, do it right.

"The expressway should be better for Levin people, not cause congestion and limit access to the town that could stifle growth."

Woodhaven Gardens director Emma Clarke says it's madness.

"It is very shortsighted. This will cost future generations dearly. The original plans were consulted on, they were consented, land has been purchased to ensure a four-lane expressway. We need to get what we consulted on."

Chief executive and principal economist at Infometrics Brad Olsen says the change in approach raises questions about how the benefits and costs of O2NL have shifted.

"Horowhenua's population is expected to continue growing strongly, with more than 20,000 additional people in the next 25 years, and O2NL will unlock greater economic opportunities with better links throughout Horowhenua. It's not clear if the change in approach is supported by analysis of anticipated traffic flows, and questions need to be asked about if the new proposal would create a less-useful outcome."

Ōtaki National MP Tim Costley says a key aim of the road was to get traffic both to and through, or past, Levin.

"I'm concerned about congestion at Tararua Road at peak daily and holiday times with a full grade-separated interchange," he says.

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'Healthy' Justin eyes Kere Kere

Horowhenua (Māori) Ward councillor Justin Tamihana has thrown his hat in the ring for a Kere Kere Ward seat in this year's council elections.

"It's time for someone younger to take on the Māori ward," he says.

Justin credits his energy to continue with a love for the outdoors – and trekking all 116 trails set up by Kiwi Guardians. The trails are no longer official, but Justin has a medal for each one on his wall at home.

They haven't not been completed alone – he took along his wife and two moko (grandkids) they are raising. The experience, along with a love for fishing and diving, had Justin drop his weight from 208kg.

"Kiwi Guardians was part of my health journey," he says. "It unlocked activity and connected me to the environment.

"I've been gifted health. I was on 7-9 pills a day for all sorts of things, from diabetes, to high blood pressure, and high cholesterol. And now I take none.

"I want to give back by serving my community. A council seat representing Kerr Kere is first on the list."

Justin says he has enjoyed his time at the council table.

"I learnt a lot from fellow councillors like Piri-Hira Tukapua. And I had huge iwi and hapū support, too."

He says he tries to be available to anyone in Horowhenua.

"I try to promote council decisions to the wider public, who seem to be confused about a lot of what we do. I advocate on all issues and

I have tried to be transparent. That's important to me."

He says he feels the council conforms too much towards anything thrown at it from Wellington – "We should test legalities more vigorously."

One frustration has been the demand from others that he declare a conflict of interest

on "anything to do with Māori". "That is undermining our roles, really.

"I am proud of the work I have done, proud to have served the community and to have been challenged by them, too."

He says Māori wards add value.

"Māori have achieved cost savings on a few big projects, such as the Saddle Road project, achieving better outcomes, and spending a week on sorting issues rather than going to the Environment Court and have the case drag on for weeks."

He says his role as a Māori Ward councillor is humbling and he's had no complaints Māori wards from anyone.

"I think we have proved our usefulness. The added value is real and we have saved on external advice, too.

"We have a different perspective on life. We like to explore the bigger picture, while most take a narrow view.

"We also look for better ways to do things and identify what might be wrong.

"We take a bird's eye view, connecting everything, and watching the ripple effect."

He says Māori give a lot to the community, for free, and all they want is to be heard.

"They want to be involved in what happens around them. And Māori wards is one way of doing it."

He's appreciated the support of Local Government NZ, which has a group for Māori ward councillors with representatives from around the country.

He is keen for Foxton to prosper, and admits there's still a lot to do, including fixing the loop, pest control and work at the estuary. Other things that grab his interest are coastal protection and saving endangered species like the long fin eel.

He would like to see more tourism development and more business in Foxton.

"We must give Foxton credit where it is due. Organisations like Save Our River Trust genuinely try to reconnect the town with the river and have revitalisation projects to achieve that."

Lions celebrate 50 years

Levin Waiopehu Lions Club celebrated 50 years with a lavish lunch at the Levin Cosmopolitan Club attended by 90 people, including past district governors and past members.

Cliff Heywood, a past international director, told stories of his time in the Navy as a young man. Mayor Bernie Wanden commended the club on its service to the local community.

Member Jim Hunter was awarded a Melvin Jones fellowship for 55 years of service to the communities he had been part of, such as his involvement with the Zealandia Wildlife Sanctuary in Wellington.

Mel Cook was given a plaque celebrating his years of service to the community, including his involvement with the community patrol.

The Melvin Jones Fellowship comes with a

special lapel pin, a plaque and a congratulatory letter.

Melvin was the founder of the Lions movement, in 1917. It was in response to social problems created by the First World War and rapid industrialisation.

Mel Cook and John Brown, the club's longest serving member, had the honour of cutting the cake, made by Diane Hemmingsen.

Club president Kevin Rawlings said it was a great event with many people coming for further afield, including one from New South Wales, to help celebrate.

Tukorehe speed protest

Ngāti Tukorehe is holding a public protest about the planned raising of the speed limit outside their marae. The protest from 2-5pm on Monday (June 2) will be along the section of State Highway 1 between Ngāti Tukorehe Marae and Ngāti Wehi Wehi Marae at Kuku. NZTA Waka Kotahi said earlier this month it would raise the limit from 80 to 100km/h. The iwi says it's a hazardous section of road running directly past the two marae, a kōhanga reo and sacred urupā. They say the decision was made without meaningful consultation with mana whenua or the local community.

Rail work nears end

The KiwiRail safety improvements at the level crossing between Cambridge and Oxford streets should be completed by the weekend. Kiwirail says it has been installing two official pedestrian crossings for the first time, which have electronic gates; upgrading the barrier arms and installing more warning lights and bells; and changing the traffic islands to improve turning for large vehicles. The work has taken several week because of the need to upgrade the complex signals system, to accommodate the new safety features. "At the same time, we have taken the opportunity to fix a fault in the rail line at the level crossing, a Kiwirail spokesperson told the Star. "This has required work on the track foundations.'

Workshops address porn

Free workshops will begin next week to address issues raised in hit Netflix show Adolescence and the accessibility of online pornography. The show highlights the difficult conversations with young people about digital radicalisation and the effects of online pornography. The Horowhenua Abuse Liaison Team (Halt) is hosting a community workshop on Tuesday (June 3) to equip parents and caregivers with tools and strategies to navigate these conversations. The session will be led by Brett Harvey, an educator and founder of Tāima Kōrero. Brett will also run a session for education providers. For information email nicole.deans@halt.org.nz

Airport terminal work begins

Construction of Palmerston North Airport's new terminal is about to begin. During the planned two-year construction, users are being asked to allow extra time when visiting the airport. While the temporary terminal is smaller, it will still accommodate all check-in, departures and arrivals. The new terminal is set to open fully in mid-2027.

Cossie Club celebrates 125 years

Pubs, clubs and hotels have come and gone in Horowhenua but one establishment has stood the test of time and is celebrating its 125th anniversary next week.

Levin Cosmopolitan Club was first established in 1900 as the Horowhenua Country Club, formed by a group of gentlemen who were refused permission to play darts in the Levin Hotel. So they got together to play their darts in an old tin shed, while still meeting regularly at the Levin Hotel, and from there the "Cossie" was born.

It's fitting that today, then, among the many social activities Levin Cosmopolitan Club encourages is state-of-the-art darts facilities with the ability to host major tournaments.

There's been name changes over the years. In 1916 it became the Levin Workingmen's Club, before adopting the current name Levin Cosmopolitan Club in 1929.

For a time it occupied a premise on Oxford Street near Bath Street before moving to its current Weraroa location in 1971, which has undergone several extensions to accommodate a growing number of members.

Club patron Tom Hayes has led a group of club members in organising activities to celebrate the 125th jubilee, with these activities also running through the week following Kings Birthday weekend.

When asked for the secret to the club's longevity, Tom says it has stayed true to its ethos as a familyorientated establishment where people can socialise in a friendly environment.

"It's a safe and family-friendly environment with a degree of decorum, and that is important," he says. "We do the basics properly and if you look after the

pennies, the pounds take care of themselves."

While the roots of Cossie is in the working class man, it has always moved with the times and in 1970s allowed female membership. Now, in 2025, the club has elected it's first-ever female president in Deb

Deb says she is passionate about the club as a place where people can relax and socialise in a safe environment.

"Although I was appointed to the role of president after we sadly lost our previous two presidents in the space of a few months, I am immensely proud to be the first female to hold this position and will be standing for election this year in the hope I can continue with a job I am very passionate about," she

"To me, clubs are at the heart of a community. The social activity, fellowship and camaraderie that come from being a club member are what drew me into my first club membership more than 40 years ago. I would encourage anyone - young or old - to find out for themselves what clubs can offer them."

With more than 1700 current members, the Levin Cosmopolitan Club is in good health and has activities to suit everyone with active adjuncts including pools, darts, indoor and outdoor bowls and

Music Festival by playing a free gig in town tomorrow afternoon.

Peanut Slab – arguably and quite possibly one of the coolest covers band ever, too – will bring their repertoire of reggae, funk and rock to a stage inside Kings Sound Centre.

The band was started by talented multi-

"We just love what we do and enjoy each other's company," Mario says.











In the beginning it meant To Assist Levin Artists, but changed to To Assist Local Artists. The label had about 40 releases. Owner Wally Clark was quick to pick up on international trends in music and always found local bands who were playing the right tune. The Warren Sisters were one of Clark's original TALA talents. Lace Covered Windows was released about 1968. Wally Clark was also a professional photographer who also cornered the Levin TV hire market.

BARNAO'S, traded in Levin from 1962-1988. It was the passion of Giuseppe Antonio Barnao, whose love of music began when we was given a clarinet in 1942. He worked in a music shop the following year and his talents saw him join dance bands and serve as an Army bandsman. He was a member of Levin bands for decades. Barnao's shop printed advertising sleeves for the records they sold. The reference to "the swinginest music store in town" would date the image to the 1960s/early 1970s. It would have been used to advertise the shop during a film at the local cinema.



THE LEVIN SALVATION ARMY BAND: Pictured about 1903, the Levin Salvation Army band was unusual as it included guitars, rather than being purely brass. Salvation Army bands achieved a high musical standard, but their aim was always to use music to draw people to the Christian gospel. They played music only from the book approved by the Army's London headquarters, and never entered band competitions. As in the photo, the Salvationists encouraged women musicians to join their bands.







Soul sisters a 70s sensation

evin was once home to one of New Zealand's best-kept soul act secrets – The Warren Sisters.

They performed for radio and TV and toured with The Platters in 1970, playing at major venues and town halls. The original Warren Sisters were Piri Henare, Diane Warren and Kathy Nahona.

The group had their roots in soul, motown and gospel, and would often perform packed

shows at Levin War Memorial Hall, sing at talent quests, and play for whānau and friends nailing their harmonies.

Along with backing band The Reflections the group released 45-records in 1970 – a cover of the hit *Never My Love* and the hometown hit *Lace Covered Windows* – on a local music label called TALA Records run by the late Wally Clark.

The beauty of modern technology has meant those songs and recordings can now be widely shared.

The backing band included younger brother Jack Warren, and Pat Davison and Gary Stokoe.

The influence of the Warren Sisters continues with whānau that inherited a love for music.

Levin man Eugene Henare, the son of Piri, was one of a generation of whānau who grew up surrounded by music.

He says they were blessed for it. He remembers going to community events where his aunties and mother performed, along with father Arthur and Uncle Jack. One of those events was the opening of the Levin Shopping Mall in 1971.

Even now those songs are sung at whānau gatherings and everyone knows the words.

"They're beautiful songs, with beautiful lyrics," he says. "*Lace Covered Windows* is our family anthem."

He says as kids they couldn't help but want to learn to play, too. Band practice was often in the lounge, and they were encouraged at every turn to express themselves musically.

"Watching them play and perform certainly planted a seed within us all, whether we went on to play instruments or not," he says.


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Taitoko song dedicated to Rich

A home-grown band called Taitoko will be playing a song that has special meaning tomorrow when they take the stage for the annual Levin Music Festival.

Rich Loved The Sea is dedicated to the late Richard Gilmore, the son of bass player Keith Murch. Richard died in 2021, aged 52, from cancer.

Being in a band can make you attune to what other band members are going through and the rest of Taitoko could see how keenly Keith felt the loss, even now. So lead singer Neil Jensen wrote a song for Keith in Richard's memory. *Rich Loved The Sea* was released this week and recorded live at Trafalgar Studios – The Engine Room.

Music doesn't take away grief, but it can help to acknowledge it, he says.

"I could see the hurt. You write songs about things that are going on around us and decided to change tack and I asked Keith if he would mind."

Neil says the track was purposely unedited in the studio. The imperfections are purposeful. The result is a deeply personal and raw tribute to someone who loved life, the ocean, and those around him.

"They're part of the truth of the moment, just as grief and love are," he says. "This song is for anyone who has lost someone. Whether they're gone or still here in another form."

He says *Rich Loved the Sea* is a song that invites listeners to pause, reflect, and remember.

The Taitoko band line-up this weekend sees Neil on guitar and lead vocals, Keith on bass guitar, Carrie Jensen on backing vocals and Jimmy Warren on drums and backing vocals.

Taitoko will play at Te Takeretanga o Kura-hau-pō Levin Library at 2pm, then take the stage at Levin Adventure Park at 4pm (wet weather venue: Firebird Café).

Manakau shocked, blindsided, betrayed and disappointed

On Sunday, May 18, more than 200 concerned Manakau locals gathered at the Manakau Hall to hear NZTA representatives present changes to 20% of the planned, consented, and much-anticipated Ō2NL expressway.

Many residents had heard rumours, but the extent of the changes left the community feeling shocked, blindsided, betrayed and disappointed. The announcement that these changes were going to the NZTA board for approval on June 19 allowed minimal time for the



community to express their concerns, giving the arrogant impression that local input was not required.

A significant concern for residents was removal of the overbridge linking Manakau Heights to the village. The original plan included a pedestrian/cycle bridge, which was later upgraded to accommodate vehicles after representations from emergency

services and locals. Manakau identity Frank Hamlin had donated land to Horowhenua District Council about 2000 to link his subdivision with the village, incurring considerable expense due to higher requirements for a local road, which necessitated deepening the original farm track to meet the required grade. His generosity being rendered ineffective is disheartening to his memory.

Without the overbridge, the village will have only one heavy vehicle entry and exit over the double-tracked railway. This crossing can be closed by trains waiting for a clear track, potentially delaying emergency

services, which could be critical in life-threatening situations.

While there is light vehicle access from SH1 to the village via the underpass on Honi Taipua Street, it is nearing the end of its effective life and cannot be relied upon long-term.

The rationale behind the numerous downgrades is that NZTA must adhere to the budget established several years ago. While the National Party and their local MP Tim Costley had campaigned for the completion of the project, they now appear to overlook the fact that the voters voted for Ō2NL to be completed as originally planned; the various

downgrades do not reflect what was voted for.

The alteration from a full interchange at Tararua Road to a roundabout seems particularly imprudent, given the impending completion of the new Tara Ika suburb development. While Tara Ika will have an alternative access to Levin via the Queen Street overbridge, Manakau will have only one, and that will not be available 100% of the time.

Come on NZTA and government, find the funds to do this once and do it right!

Info on landlord-tenant relationships

Every year several issues that arise in the relationships between landlords and tenants.

In truth, all landlords and tenants have responsibilities under the Residential Tenancies Act 1986. Citizens Advice Bureau has a lot of information on the subject.

Landlord's responsibilities – When renting out a property, landlords need to:

- make sure the property is in a reasonable condition
- let the tenant have quiet enjoyment of the property
- meet all relevant building, health and safety standards
- handle any abandoned goods in the correct way
- inform the tenant if the property is for sale
 have an agent if they are out of New
- have an agent if they are out of Nev Zealand for more than 21 days.
 They can't:
- seize the tenant's goods for any reason
- interfere with the supply of any services to the premises, unless it is necessary to avoid danger to a person or to allow repairs.

Tenant's responsibilities – When renting a property, tenants need to:

- pay the rent on time
- keep the property reasonably clean and tidy
- let the landlord know about any damage or repairs straight away
- pay for their own outgoings eg, electricity, gas and internet



- use the property mainly for residential purposes rather than business activities
- leave the property clean, tidy, and clear of rubbish and possessions
- leave all keys with the landlord when they move out
- leave all items that were supplied with the tenancy.
 Tenants must not:
- stop paying rent if the landlord hasn't
 done repairs
- damage the premises
- disturb the neighbours or the landlord's other tenants
- make any alterations to the property without the landlord's written consent
- use the property for any unlawful purpose
- have more than the maximum number of occupants listed in the tenancy agreement.

 $Both\ landlords\ and\ tenants\ are\ responsible\ for:$

- making sure the tenancy agreement is in writing
- keeping their contact details up to date
- not changing the locks without permission.

If you are in a unit title property (for example an apartment or townhouse), you

must also follow the body corporate rules. *Renting to disabled tenants*

Disabled people make up 24% of New Zealand's population. They have a wide range of diverse needs, and it's important they have a safe, accessible place to live. A range of services and support is available that will help landlords on how to provide appropriate housing. These services include:

- Enable New Zealand: provides disability services, equipment and modifications
- Federation of Disability Information Centres: supports local disability information and referral services
- Life Unlimited : supporting disabled people, including their housing needs
- Accessible Properties: provide homes and property management services to people with disabilities, older people and those on low incomes
- CCS Disability Action: a broad range of support services for disabled people, family and whanau.

Making changes to your rental home

Recent changes to tenancy law could make things easier for tenants with disabilities. Landlords now can't decline a tenant's request to make changes to their rental property – as long as the change is minor. This change makes it easier for tenants to add fixtures like grab rails, visual fire alarms or doorbells.

Important to know updates in commercial property lease form

If you own a commercial property in New Zealand, chances are you're using the standard lease form prepared by the Law Association.

In November 2024, it released the seventh edition of this lease, and it's had some important updates. Because this is the most commonly used lease in the country, it's a good idea to get familiar with what's changed. Here's a quick summary:

- 1. Rent reviews: You now have a third choice when setting up rent reviews: fixed increases (eg 2% per year). You can also agree on a maximum and minimum rent, so the rent doesn't go too high or low during reviews.
- **2. Outgoings:** The list of outgoings (costs the tenant pays on top of rent, like rates and maintenance) has been updated. Landlords now need to:



- give tenants a budget of these costs each year before the lease anniversary
- provide documents (like council rates or insurance bills) if the tenant asks.

3. Lease security: There are now different ways for the landlord to secure rental payments under the lease. The landlord and tenant can agree on:

- a bank guarantee
- a rental bond.

The landlord also needs to confirm whether their bank (or mortgage holder) needs to give

permission for the lease.

4. Insurance: The default insurance excess the tenant pays has gone up to \$5000 (was \$2500). If the tenant damages something and the repair cost is less than the excess, they have to cover the full cost themselves.

- **5. Seismic information:** Landlords must:
- share the seismic rating of the building with
- keep tenants updated if new information comes to light.

However, landlords don't have to guarantee the rating is correct.

- **6. Health and safety:** The lease now spells out that both parties must meet their obligations under the Health and Safety at Work Act 2015.
- **7. Emergencies:** If the tenant can't access the building in an emergency (like during a flood or

earthquake), they may get a 50% rent reduction by default. Alternatively, you can agree upfront on a different amount or a "fair proportion" depending on the situation, rather than the default 50%.

Why this matters

If you're signing a new commercial lease, it's important to understand these updates and make sure the terms fit your situation.

Also keep in mind: even if you only sign an Agreement to Lease, these new terms will still apply, even if you don't sign a Deed of Lease later. **Need help?**

It's worth having a lawyer look over the lease with you. That way you can make sure you're getting the right deal and avoiding future surprises. Feel free to contact CS Law if you would like to know more.

Work to do for Labour post-budget

Budget '25 was carefully crafted to provide a platform that places Labour in an extremely difficult position if it is to satisfy its core constituency and attract sufficient new voters to move beyond the constraints imposed by association with the Greens and Te Pati Maori (TPM).

Without comprehensive increases in taxation it is hard to see how it can restore, as some of its MPs have promised, the pay equity position that existed before budget month and at the same time assemble a prudent balance of expenditure

that doesn't add significantly to the nation's indebtedness.

Within the ruling coalition,
National received criticism for
not taking bolder steps to address
deficit spending. Act members
had a similar view to National's
right flank. NZ first voters seemed
satisfied that Winston the Wily had
again pulled a rabbit from a hat and
had a budget presented that mostly
satisfied their middle of the road

instincts.

Public opinion polls regularly reflect that the most pressing public concerns are the economy, health, education, law and order. All these itches were scratched: the economy through a better depreciation regime for business capital spending; both the health and education sectors had bigger financial allocations; and police and the defence force needs were catered for with fresh funding.

The coalition parties are broadly in political control. Should a backlash on the pay equity decision prove ongoing in the early months of next year, Budget '26 can address it. Should unemployment be on the rise, room can be made for measures to alleviate it. And while constant sniping by health and education

unions within the public services is certain to continue, the government can emphasise that funding continues to rise year-on-year despite tough economic times.

Labour's path to the Treasury benches is

fraught with obstacles. Since budget day Peters has ruled out joining with Labour to make a government as long as Chris Hipkins is leader; TPM and the Greens have shown no sign of easing their rhetoric to attract wider support outside their core constituencies; and acceptance of budgetary restraints by finance spokesperson Barbara Edmonds places constraints on what it can offer unless significant tax

increases are a part of its election policy.

Localised rows over government spending, such as the NZTA cost savings amendments to the projected Otaki-Levin highway, will help Labour, and test the coalition's responsiveness. Growing impressions across the country that the coalition feels it can brush off community feelings with impunity can quickly erode the support of all three member parties.

Labour needs a change in apparent public acceptance of the need for careful fiscal management as under the Willis model. It would also be helped by developments abroad that thrust security issues much higher into public consciousness than has happened to date.

At the centre of this is divergence of views

Without comprehensive increases in taxation it is hard to see how [Labour] can restore, as some of its MPs have promised, the pay equity position that existed before budget month and at the same time assemble a prudent balance of expenditure that doesn't add significantly to the nation's indebtedness.

among the country's Western allies on the handling of Russia's war in Ukraine and America's trade war with the EU. Currently the coalition is maintaining its relationship with Washington along "business as usual" lines that encompass the universal 10 percent tariff regime.

Neither New Zealand nor Australia have suffered direct unwelcome policy pronouncements of substance from the US president, although the Australian defence force is nervous about the Americans' timetable for supply of nuclear submarines under arrangements with Canberra.

But should President Donald Trump decide to take the US out of the allied front against Russia over its invasion of Ukraine, and at the same time seek closer business ties between Washington and Moscow, there will be "diplomatic blood".

There is good reason to believe that Trump is breaking down the strengths of American economic might and muscle through his fixation with tariffs on friends and competitors alike.

These imposts and daily, weekly percentage changes disrupt supply chains and create uncertainties. Forced reductions of research and development programmes, including those associated with technologies, contribute further to the picture of an America in decline.

It may be that Trump sees both big business opportunities in Russia and an opportunity for a political initiative that will wrest Moscow away from its close relationship with Beijing. But achieving such a transformation at the expense of the Western European alliance committed to resisting Russian hegemony is more likely to strengthen Beijing's influence in the West and Third World.

Do Kiwi voters have the stomach to outlast the four-year Trump presidency? Can Labour exploit unease about American reliability to electoral advantage? Historically it has a record of burnishing Sino-Kiwi relationships that could be the basis of electoral appeal if strategic security becomes a major issue.



Referee abuse comes to a head

Rugby's ugly underbelly came to a head at the weekend when an official was hit with a thrown flag post and threatened with stabbing at a Horowhenua-Kāpiti club fixture.

HKRU chief executive Corey Kennett says it is continuing to investigate the incident, which has drawn worldwide attention.

Abuse of officials has become commonplace and is something HKRU and its affiliated clubs want desperately to stamp out.

Referees were volunteers that gave up their weekend- often doing more than one match only to suffer the indignity of sideline abuse.

Corey says there needs to be a seismic culture shift in the way referees were treated. The equation is simple. No referee – no game. But he couldn't ignore that fact that the

vast majority of people are respectful. It was a small minority that had become increasingly abusive, and there is no place on the sideline for them or the abuse.

"It needs a whole-ofcommunity approach. The standard you walk past is the standard you accept," he says. "We've reached a point where we need to make a stand. These people are not welcome."

HKRFU had front-footed the issue with a statement on social media saying it is "deeply concerned" about the escalating abuse.

That included "recent incidents of verbal

threats, threats of physical harm, including being stabbed, and actual physical abuse."

The post triggered an overwhelming response in support of referees, including messages of support from other sporting codes and from overseas.

The statement says the situation has reached a tipping point and safety of referees was a

"This behaviour is completely unacceptable and stands in direct opposition to the values of

respect, safety, and integrity that underpin our great game."

Corey says it's a nationwide issue.

"Referees are essential volunteers to the sport we all love, and they deserve to officiate without fear of abuse or intimidation.

"We all have a part to play. Let's protect our referees, our game, and each other. Stand up and show your support for our match officials."

HKRU, with the support of all clubs, has taken the stance that any further incidents of serious referee abuse will see a weekend of senior club rugby cancelled.

"This is not a decision we take lightly, but it is a necessary step to send a clear and unequivocal message - abuse will not be tolerated."

In the past the union had run a campaign challenging people to "put your whistle where your mouth is".

The fact is it is hard enough to attract and retain referees due to natural attrition without losing them to sideline abuse.




